CINCINNATI WATER WORKS AT CALIFORNIA

In 1839 the City of Cincinnati assumed the task of supplying water to the residents, which had been since 1817, done poorly by private operators. The new Water Dept., using the Front St. works it had purchased, had a constant struggle over the years, with machinery that was frequently breaking down, inadequate because of rising demand, and the lack of money for significant The first action toward improvements. major upgrading came in 1872 as a result of a report recommending that the water intake be located 10 miles up-river from the city to avoid pollution. The city then purchased the 150 -acre Jacob Markley farm on the New Richmond Pike (now Kellogg) near Five Mile Rd. But the

estimated cost of \$4.5 million for construction of the new plant was far beyond the means of the city. As it was, the city was barely able to fund the Water Department so that it could meet the mushrooming demand with new pumps and reservoirs. Public clamor for better service and cleaner water resulted in the appointment of a commission in I888 to investigate the "water question". Their report concluded that: "It is imperatively necessary for the integrity and purity of the water supply....to abandon the present pumping station.

The Ohio River above the Little Miami should be the origin of supply. "The intake should consist of an intake tower on the Kentucky shore. The best location for the pumping station is on the Ohio shore between the Little Miami River and the town of California. Settling basins should be built on the high ground back of California." Cost estimates of the proposed new water works, depending on daily capacity, was from \$4 million to \$6.5 million. Despite the urging of the commission for quick action, the city was unable to make any large financial commitments in the next decade. There were many more studies made and reports filed, including those of the State Board of Health and the Cincinnati Academy of Medicine regarding the increasingly bad condition of the water. Finally, in 1896, the state legislature passed "An Act to Provide for Water Works in Cities" spelling out the duties and responsibilities of commissioners of water works and allowing the cities to issue water works bonds. Cincinnati quickly appointed such a commission, calling it a board of trustees. They in turn selected a chief engineer to supervise and coordinate preparation of plans and specifications for the new plant, following the recommendations of the 1888 report. It was his job also to oversee all phases of construction.

Most of the 325 acres of land needed for the California installation had to be acquired by the lengthy process of condemnation. The two largest parcels involved were a 176-acre tract of the Ebersole estate, fronting on the Ohio, and 81 acres of the Farenkamp land "on the hill" northeast of the village. (Note: I have a pic of Fahrenkamp farm). There was less trouble negotiating with the City of Covington to purchase a plot for the intake pier and the Commonwealth of Kentucky for 10 acres of riverbed under which was driven an eight-foot diameter, 1400-foot-long tunnel from the pier to the pumping station. In order to have an undivided piece of land, the city had to purchase "that part of the Columbia and New Richmond Turnpike from the toll house at Salem P:ike to the school house at California."

The first contacts for the intake pier and tunnel, were awarded in May 1898. Work began two weeks later. From then on except for bad weather and some contractual problems, construction was continuous on the huge project. It included the previously mentioned pier and tunnel, the California pumping station, the filtration plant, two settling basins (with a capacity of 330 million gallons), the four-mile-long, seven-foot-diameter tunnel to the Eastern Avenue pumping station, and large three-foot and four-foot mains to the Eden Park reservoir and to various parts of the

city. The entire system cost \$11.5 million and was completed by October 1907, when the first water flowed through the mains. In the first full year of service an average of 3-1/2 million gallons per day was delivered. The same basic plant in California modernized and enlarged, now supplies an average of 180 million gallons of water daily to a vastly expanded area, with additional thousands of customers.
